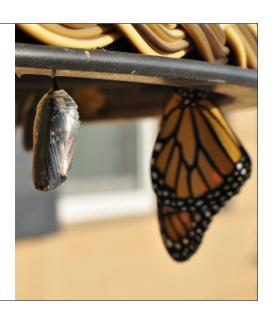

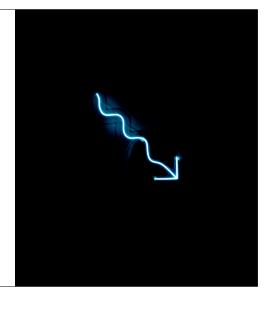


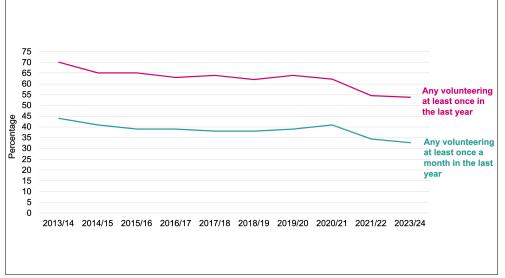




Volunteer rates Declining

- Regular formal volunteering dropped to it's lowest level since 2000 during lockdown and has flatlined since.
- Occasional formal volunteering has flat-lined since 2021-22 and is down 9% since the year before Covid, and dropped 17% since a decade ago.



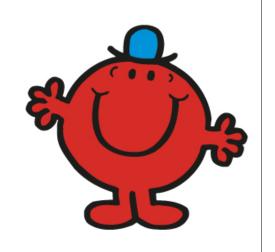


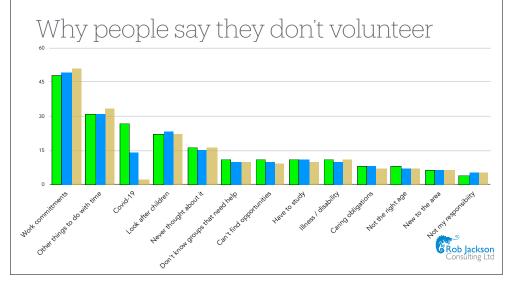


Time given

Between 2000 and 2015

- Ave. all ages 3.67 declining to 3.47 days a year (almost 5 hrs a year)
- Aged 16-24 —2.28 increasing to 4.31 days a year
- Aged 25-34 3.8 decreasing to 1.5 days a year
- Aged 65+ 4.82 decreasing to 3.3 days a year

"We shouldn't rely on outdated ways of doing things. Today's new volunteers are more likely to be younger people in employment than retired people."



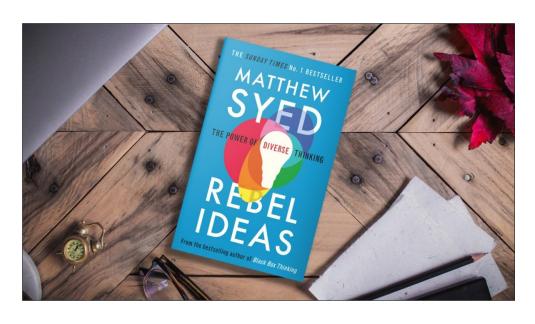
